County buildings named in honor of Dunning and Rigdon

On Tuesday, April 1, 2025, Okaloosa County Commissioners unanimously voted to name two county-owned buildings after individuals who have made immense contributions to the community over the years - Charles Hutton "Bull" Rigdon Jr. and Sheila Dunning.

RIGDON CENTER

Commissioners approved renaming the fairgrounds as the "Rigdon Center," named for Charles Hutton "Bull" Rigdon Jr, who passed away in December 2014.

SHEILA DUNNING AGRICULTURE EXTENSION OFFICE

A new 3,000-square-foot facility used by the county's University of Florida Institute of Food and Agriculture Services will now be named in honor of Sheila Dunning, a respected commercial horticulture extension agent who died earlier this year after 23 years of educating and supporting local nursery projects.

Taking Shape - Bridges and Roads

The Shoal River Ranch Industrial Park is taking shape east of Crestview. The roads and other developing infrastructure will benefit future tenants as well as the state-of-the-art Shoal River Ranch Water Reclamation Facility currently under construction. The new facility is a major step forward in expanding wastewater treatment capacity for future needs in north Okaloosa County. The \$40.8 million plant has multiple funding sources, including federal and state grants and a generous state legislative appropriation. The new plant will be built on 20 acres of designated property at the Shoal River Ranch. The plant is expected to be completed in late 2026.



Before adding lime to soil, don't guess, soil test

Applying lime when lime is not needed may have disastrous results in a lawn, landscape or garden.

The pH scale ranges from 0 to 14, with 7 being neutral. Numbers above 7 indicate alkaline soils. Numbers below 7 indicate acidic soils. Some people refer to acid soil as sour and alkaline soil as sweet.

Soil pH is important for plants. It influences the availability of fertilizer and toxic elements in the soil. It affects how well beneficial bacteria breakdown plant residues in soil. It also impacts nutrient leaching.

Plants have a range of tolerance to the pH level of soil. Plant nutrients are most available in the pH range of 5.5 to 6.5. However, certain plants need either acid or alkaline soils. Azaleas, blueberries, camellias, centipedegrass, bahiagrass, dogwoods, gardenias, hollies and magnolias need more acidic soils (soils with a pH below 5.5). These plants grow poorly in more alkaline soil because certain essential elements such as iron and copper begin to lock up in an insoluble form and become poorly available when the pH is too alkaline. Applying too much lime can cause this. These "acid-loving" plants, rarely need lime.

There are other plants that prefer a pH above 6 such as ash, butterfly bush, elm, pink hydrangea, sycamore and yucca.

The only way to know if lime is needed is to have your soil pH tested.
