Goodwin, Palmer selected to lead Okaloosa County Commission in 2026





Extension Services Awarded the Florida Master Gardener Volunteer Legacy Award!

The UF/IFAS Okaloosa County Master Gardener Volunteer (MGV) Program received a Florida Master Gardener Volunteer Legacy Award.

Through a statewide competitive process, the Okaloosa County MGV project received \$1,100 to achieve the proposed project focused on having a positive impact in the Okaloosa County community. Specifically, the MGV will partner with Okaloosa Technical College's to expand the Unique Professionals (UP) Culinary Garden Program. The Okaloosa UP program is the fist in Okaloosa County to offer an inclusive college experience for adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Through gardening, culinary arts, and building trades, UP students develop practical skills preparing them for success as active participants in their communities.

The UP program creates an innovative model of experiential learning where students follow the complete cycle of food production from planting and nurturing seeds to harvesting herbs and vegetables to incorporating them into meals. MGVs support the UP program in a multitude of ways such as classroom instruction, individualized mentoring, hands-on gardening and maintenance, and leadership building. Extension Services is excited for this continued partnership and benefit to UP students supporting our community.


